A lot was done to our church building and grounds over the last several years. We would not have been able to do everything without a lot of team work. Thanks to all. Robert Bushman


United Methodist Women Activities

Bazaar crafters will not meet in January, but will meet monthly beginning later in 2020. Meetings will be announced in the Evangel.




Our January book is "An American Marriage" by Tayari Jones. Newlyweds Celestial and Roy are the embodiment of both the American Dream and the New South. He is a young executive, and she is an artist on the brink of an exciting career. But as they settle into the routine of their life together, they are ripped apart by circumstances neither could have imagined. Roy is arrested and sentenced to 12 years for a crime Celestial knows he didn't commit.

Though fiercely independent, Celestial finds herself bereft and unmoored, taking comfort in Andre, her childhood friend, and best man at their wedding. As Roy's time in prison passes, she is unable to hold on to the love that has been her center. After five years, Roy's conviction is suddenly overturned, and he returns

to Atlanta ready to resume their life together. This love story is a look into the hearts and minds of three people who are at once bound and separated by forces beyond their control.

Our next book is "The Silk Roads - A New History of the World" by Peter Frankopan. This book realigns our understanding of the history of the world, pointing us eastward. It was on the Silk Roads that East and West first encountered each other through trade and conquest, leading to the spread of ideas, cultures and religions. From the rise and fall of empires to the spread of Buddhism and the advent of Christianity and Islam, right up to the great wars of the twentieth century—this book shows how the fate of the West has always been inextricably linked to the East. The vast region stretching eastward from the Balkans across the steppe and South Asia has been thrust into the global spotlight in recent years. Frankopan teaches us that to understand what is at stake for the cities and nations built on these intricate trade routes, we must first understand their astounding pasts.

History of United Methodist Women

Since 2019 is the 150th anniversary of the United Methodist Women, we have decided to print a series of articles here in the Evangel to celebrate our beginnings and to show how we are continuing the journey begun by our faithful and courageous foremothers. Roots of United Methodist Women

Our roots come from the faith and work of women's missionary societies of eight denominations. The highlights are as follows:

1869 The Woman's Foreign Missionary Society is formed in Boston, MA at the Tremont Methodist Episcopal Church. Isabella Thoburn and Clara Swain leave for India in November, 1869 as the Society's first missionaries. 1880 The Woman's Home Missionary Society is organized and Lucy Webb Hayes is elected president. 1910 The Woman's Societies of the M. E. Church, South are joined under one Woman's Missionary Council and made part of the general missionary organization of the church. Belle Harris Bennett is elected president and serves until 1922.

Without the woman's mission organization in the church, the work of mission would not have had such strong support spiritually or financially. The women who guided the Woman's Home and Foreign Missionary Societies were firmly united in devotion to a task they believed to be of supreme importance to the church, the community and to the world. The desire of women in the various missionary societies to have a special part in the missionary work of the church grew rapidly during the early years of the organizations. They delighted in the fact that they could raise funds, manage administrative details, train and deploy missionaries to foreign lands. Their efforts were far reaching. Between the years 1869 and 1903 missionaries were sent to India, China, Mexico, South America, Bulgaria, Sierra Leone, Japan, Italy, Malaysia, Korea, and the Philippines. Upon arrival in the countries assigned, women missionaries founded schools and orphanages for girls and boys, established medical clinics, taught English as a second language, worked with women on health issues, and supported the work of Bible women.

Our next installment will explore the origins of UMW mission work within the United States.

BLESSED SACRIFICES

Blessedly, it did not rain the night I sat out by the stable with seven others – two shepherds, two kings, an angel, Mary, Joseph. But as the darkness became darker, the cold became colder until we were thoroughly frosted. The two alpacas, however, arrogantly maintained their toasty warm demeanor.

As I uncomfortably sat and stood there, I pondered stewardship. Mary and Joseph were given the greatest stewardship responsibility of all — care of the Son of God, God Incarnate. Their acceptance of that task certainly called for far greater sacrifice than my enduring the cold night air for a couple of hours.

Yet, as it so often is with sacrifice, Mary and Joseph reaped great joy.

And Mary said,
My soul magnifies the Lord,
and my spirit rejoices in God
my Savior,
for he has looked with favor on the
lowliness of his servant.
Surely, from now on all generations
will call me blessed;
for the Mighty One has done great

and holy is his name.

So, whatever sacrifices we make – whether it is committing to the tithe, showing up every week to teach Sunday school, volunteering to read scripture in the worship service, attending the worship service even when we don't feel like it, singing in the choir, serving on committees, bringing food, washing dishes, responding to God's call to mission – we can take comfort in knowing that God will provide joy to go along with the challenges.

The joy I received from sitting out in the cold was derivative of the joy the children got from seeing and petting the alpacas, which animals would not have been there had we not put on a "living nativity." That sort of joyful experience enhances a child's view of church and makes it more likely that he or she will continue as a member of the community in later life.

May the new year be filled with opportunities for sacrificial stewardship and may we all experience the resulting joys.
